• The American Legion Magazine is mailed to all members; additional subscriptions are \$6 per year for posts. A spoken version of the magazine is available, at no charge, for visually impaired and physically disabled members of The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary and SAL.

• The American Legion Dispatch is a free monthly e-newsletter providing post, district and department officers with news relevant to membership recruitment and retention, post activities and community support, American Legion programs, troop support, veterans benefits and more. The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Program

The official flower of The American Legion is the poppy. As a nationally recognized symbol of sacrifice, the poppy is worn to honor the men and women who served and died for their country in all wars. Every May, Legion, Auxiliary and SAL volunteers distribute millions of bright red crepe paper poppies for contributions to assist disabled and hospitalized veterans. As the oldest and most widely recognized American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary program, this campaign provides multiple benefits to veterans and their communities. Resolution No. 20, "The American Legion Poppy Program," passed by the National Executive Committee in May 2013, outlines the proper use, manufacture and distribution of the poppies and raised funds. All funds are to be used for honorably discharged U.S. veterans; for the welfare of veterans' families; for the rehabilitation of hospitalized military personnel returning home and awaiting discharge who require treatment in service hospitals; and for the welfare of veterans, active military personnel and their families where financial and medical need is evident. Priority is to be given to veterans first in the manufacture of poppies. All American Legion posts and SAL squadrons are encouraged to establish a poppy program following the guidelines and procedures established by their respective departments. Per Resolution No. 4, passed by the National Executive Committee in October 2016, The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary advocate for a congressional declaration establishing National Poppy Week, starting the Monday before and continuing through Memorial Day, to bring greater significance to the poppy as a symbol of veterans' sacrifices for freedom.

SERVICE OFFICER SNIPPET

What are VA priority groups and how do they affect me?

When you apply for VA health care, Veterans Healthcare Administration (VHA) will assign you to 1 of 8 priority groups. Your priority group may affect: 1) How soon VHA will sign you up for health care benefits, and

2) How much (if anything) you'll have to pay toward the cost of your care.

VHA assigns Veterans with service-connected disabilities the highest priority. VHA assigns the lowest priority to Veterans who earn a higher income and *who don't have any service-connected disabilities qualifying them for disability compensation* (monthly payments). See the attached VHA Priority Groups Chart for descriptions.

My HealtheVet is moving to VA.gov: What to know

With My Health*e*Vet on VA.gov, you'll be able to manage all of your VA health care in the same place you manage your other VA benefits and services.

What this change means for you

When you sign in to My Health*e*Vet on VA.gov, you'll continue to have access to the same health tools and information you use today. Over time, additional features, like the ability to manage your travel reimbursement claims, we become available. If you get your care at a VA health facility that uses the My VA Health portal today, you'll also be able to manage your care in the new My Health*e*Vet on VA.gov. This move will also make it even easier for you to manage your care and benefits from any digital device, like your smartphone or tablet. For example, you'll be able to pull up your medical records on your smartphone on the go. And if you use assistive technology such as a screen reader, the new My Health*e*Vet on VA.gov should be even easier for you to use.

When to expect changes

This transition will take time. VA is gradually building new versions of each tool on My HealtheVet onto VA.gov based and will provide notice when each tool is ready for Veterans who use both the existing My HealtheVet and My VA Health portals to try. 
